

The Six Key Directives of The Remedy:

- Work with individuals to create support plans that meet their specific needs.

The Mi'kmaw Disability Care Coordinator will help Mi'kmaw individuals identify support and services that best reflect their plan, their way.

- Closing all large institutions and supporting people with disabilities to live in their community of choice.

- Supporting service providers to create and deliver community-based support that meet the needs of people with disabilities within CMM's eight communities.

- Working with healthcare providers and disability support professionals to ensure Indigenous people with disabilities can access the care they need close to home by creating a culturally safe allied health care team.

- Providing disability support funding to individuals and supporting them to make their own decisions about how that funding is used.

- Thinking and working differently across the system to better support Mi'kmaw people with disabilities.

They help adults navigate services and support, with an emphasis on cultural connection, to achieve an independent life through the methodology of Mawi-Apo'qmaq'tuntine'j, an evidence-based initiative promoting resilience, inclusion and cultural connections for Mi'kmaw individuals with disabilities and their families.

The Nova Scotia Human Rights Remedy
